It's good that it's available since nearly every day since we've had a bit of snow and sleet and enjoyed one day of a high temperature of seventy. Spring renewal. Renewal for our local League, too, with new faces and leadership.

Come Saturday, May 8 at 9:15 am to the Ponderosa Restaurant in Dolores for our Annual business meeting and to hear our Speaker, Ashton Harrison, County Administrator.

We haven't heard from EPA regarding our proposal for a senior position to represent the whole Four Corners to the three EPA regions that oversee it. We soon will ask Rep. John Salazar to make a Congressional request for an answer. In the meantime, we have sent a comment to the BLM regarding an Environmental Assessment to allow Kinder Morgan to drill for CO2 in the Canyon of the Ancients. I encourage you to send your own comments, but hurry as the deadline in May 5. Read our comments on our website.

As the 2010 election cycle gets underway with primary elections across the country, consider the opportunities this season offers to help build our League. Remember that election season should not only be a time to make a difference in our communities, but to make a difference in the League as well. We can demonstrate that sustaining a democracy requires an informed voter.

We've set dates for Election Forums: Primary, General and Ballot Issues and the Voters Service Team is readily accepting volunteers to help with various tasks. We're anticipating a need for a major education effort on Ballot Issues. The potential for some of the initiatives is great confusion on the part of the voter.

Carol Tullis, Montezuma County Clerk and Recorder, will be our meeting speaker Monday June 14, 11:30 am and talk about the new voting regulations, the online voter registration program and other issues we'll need to know when conducting our voter service activities this year. Mark that date on your calendar.

The League of Women Voters of Colorado Council 2010 will meet May 21-22 in Estes Park at the Lake Shore Lodge. It will begin on Friday, May 21 at 1 p.m. and continue until noon, Saturday, May 22. The order of business will be Board elections, adoption of the 2010 budget, a Legislative Wrap-up, workshops and a special program speaker. Carbon Dioxide Drilling on Canyon of Ancients

The BLM is accepting comments on the Environmental Assessment of a proposal by Kinder Morgan to drill carbon dioxide (CO2) wells and install collection and transportation facilities on public lands within the boundaries of the BLM Canyons of the Ancients National Monument. The project would take place on Burro Point, near the eastern boundary of the Monument and about 15 miles west-northwest of Cortez in Montezuma County. Written public comments must be postmarked by Tuesday, May 4, 2010, and mailed to Manager, Canyons of the Ancients National Monument, 27501 Highway 184, Dolores, CO 81323. League Education Funds exist at all levels of League – US, CO and Montezuma. Folks can contribute to the Education Fund, a non-profit 501(3c) organization, and can receive a tax-deductible statement. These funds are managed very separately from non-tax deductible contributions to a League's operational funds. Education Funds can be used to pay half of payment per member fees to the national and state organizations and are used to fund educational activities of a League such as costs associated with an educational forum.

Election Season 2010 is cranking up very quickly and Voter Service plans are underway. At the state level, committees are formed for several projects including website development, a candidate guide for the website, TV debates for US Senate and Governor, and efforts to track the progress or lack of progress regarding potential Ballot Issues for the November ballot.

Cleaning Up Colorado's Air

The House Bill: "Incentives for Utilities to Convert from Coal to Natural Gas" was a bipartisan effort that anticipates emission requirements of the federal Clean Air Act. The bill requires **Investor Owned Utilities** (IOUs) that own or operate coal-fired electric generating plants to submit an emissions reduction plan for those units. The plan to the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) will be due by August 15, 2010, and is required to cover 900 megawatts or 50% of the IOU's generating capacity whichever is less. The plan must consider the conversion of the unit to natural gas or other low-emission resources. The PUC will provide the Department of Public Health and Environment with an opportunity to comment on the plan and will evaluate the plan considering several factors including the emissions reductions achieved and any potential rate impacts. The PUC must complete its review of the plan by December 15, 2010. Plans must be fully implemented by December 31, 2017.

However, electric cooperatives are not required to make a similar reduction.

Let's hope immigration reform rises to the top of President Obama's list now that health care reform has been passed. Take this opportunity to review the [national immigration position](#) we worked so hard on back in 2008:

And look over the University of Denver's 2009 report [Architecture for Immigration Reform: Fitting the Pieces of Public Policy](#). Richard Ballantine, publisher of The Cortez Journal, was one of 20 panel

members. The panel's recommendations are on pages 45-46. Then to get a picture of how things really are, in Denver at least, read Helen Thorpe's new book ***Just Like Us***, the story of four very bright Hispanic immigrant girls, two of whom are legal residents, two undocumented, and their trials and tribulations through advanced placement classes in high school and then college. You'd be surprised at the problems undocumented students have; one student could have received a full scholarship to Whittier College in California but she would have had to travel by ground transportation to the interview and back and forth if she were accepted because she did not have paperwork needed to board a commercial plane. Journalist Thorpe is Mayor Hickenlooper's wife and in that capacity was able to include in the book the girls' stories as well as a unique perspective on legislative and political thinking during the period.

Online resources for information on health-care reform

The ink was hardly dry on the health-care overhaul law when foundations, industry groups and consumer advocates began putting together guides to the new rules. Here are some Web sites worth keeping an eye on:

Kff.org: The Kaiser Family Foundation Web site has a lot of thorough information. To get started, under "New & Noteworthy," click on "summary of the law" for a good synopsis, and on "timeline" to see when various provisions of the law are scheduled to kick in. Familiesusa.org: Families USA is a nonprofit advocacy organization for health-care consumers. Click on the link to "Health Reform Central" to see just about everything you need to know about the new law. To get

a [recap](#) of the major changes, click on the link that begins "Help is on the way" on the homepage.

Healthinsuranceproviders.com: Click on "Health Care Reform" to see a [timeline](#) that's less descriptive than Kaiser's, but easier to grasp visually. The site belongs to an online insurance broker; if you're looking for health insurance, be sure to shop around other sites and brokers.

Whitehouse.gov/health-insurance-consumer-protections: This is straight from the Obama administration. Keep in mind, it helped write the law. Tune out the superlatives and compare the information with the facts from advocacy groups such as Medicare Rights Center.

Consumerreports.org/health: From Consumer Reports, a [range](#) of useful information. Scroll to the bottom of the page, and click on "Health-care reform."

Bankrate.com: From a Web site where borrowers hunt for low mortgage rates and savers look for high-interest CDs, there's a [summary](#) with a good focus on costs. Type "reform" into the search box, and click on "What's in it for you."

Marchofdimes.com: The March of Dimes summarizes [key new provisions](#) for women and children. Click on "In the news."

Medicarerights.org: The Medicare Rights Center summarizes key new provisions for seniors; click on the big box that says "learn more about health reform and Medicare."

Stay tuned -- in the coming weeks, the Department of Health and Human Services plans to launch a Web site on health-care reform including links to health insurance options it deems affordable in each state.

Later this month, The Post, in partnership with PublicAffairs, will be publishing a book on the new legislation, including a consumer guide to its impact. "Landmark: The Inside Story of America's New Health-Care Law and What it Means for Us All" can be pre-ordered from Amazon.com and other book Web sites.

THE AMERICAN INDIAN HEALTH CARE SYSTEM

The American Indian health care system is a completely separate system and is largely unknown outside of Indian Country. To understand this system, we can learn about the historical relationship between Native Americans and the federal government, and why the United States has the responsibility to provide health care for 3.3 million

American Indians and Alaska Natives belonging to 564 federally recognized Tribes.

Voter Registration Online

We will be hearing more about this from Carol Tullis when she speaks at our June 14 general meeting, but here’s some info on a paperless voter registration option. As of April 6th any Colorado resident with a Colorado driver’s license or state ID can register to vote through the Secretary of State’s web site, **GoVoteColorado.com**. The online form will require the same information as the current registration form, which also remains available to Colorado citizens. Staff at the county clerk’s offices will have final approval of the online voter registration application, providing an additional layer of scrutiny. Colorado is one of three states in the U.S. with this program.

The GoColorado site has been intermixed with another site that had nothing to do with voter registration so if you don’t get the right site, you might want to try the Secretary of State’s site, www.sos.state.co.us/, click on the elections section, then the register to vote line.

When EPA proposes stricter air standards it will put pressure on Four Corners

The Four Corners along with most of the western United States could fall out of attainment of federal ozone limits under new standards being considered by the EPA. The agency is proposing to tighten its “primary” ozone standard from 75 parts per billion to a level within the range of 60 ppb and 70 ppb. The stricter standard is based on findings

about the health effects of ozone, particularly on the elderly, children and people with respiratory problems.

The EPA is expected to announce its final decision about the standard in late summer. It will be the second time in about two years that the agency has imposed a more stringent limit. In March 2008, the limit was moved from 84 ppb to the current level of 75 ppb despite a recommendation from the EPA's independent scientific advisory panel that it be lower still.

"Most monitoring sites in the Four Corners Region currently would be in violation of the new ozone NAAQS (national ambient air quality standards" reports John Molenaar, an air-quality expert with Air Resource Specialists. He reports that the major share of ozone-producing emissions in the Four Corners region come from energy production, including natural-gas wells and two large-scale coal-fired power plants near Farmington. Vehicles and many other human activities also contribute to the presence of Ozone in the region.

Mike Silverstein, deputy director of the Air Pollution Control Division at the Colorado health department said being classified as out of attainment is a "big deal" because it requires affected areas to come up with detailed plans for reducing emissions related to ozone.

The cost of either producing cleaner power or curtailing O&G production will get passed on to consumers in the form of more expensive energy or fewer jobs. "The bottom line is, we're going to pay for it," Molenaar wrote. Moreover, the most effectual measures, such as shutting down the coal-fired power plants, may be economically untenable. Because of this, he said his personal opinion is that expectations for improvement must be reasonable.

Call for Voter Services Volunteers

The LWVMZC Voter Services team invites members to help with Voter Services projects. Even if you are not able to make a longer-term commitment as a member of the team, you can make a valuable contribution just by helping out with a one-time task such as being a timer at a forum.

We've held three candidate forums this year and will be holding at least two more for primary and general elections. Additionally, we'll have a Ballot Issue Forum in late September and we'll be speaking to various groups about 2010 Ballot Issues in October.

The Ballot Issues will be challenging this year. Fortunately Gerry Cummins is working with the Secretary of State now to write the LWVCO Ballot Issue Pamphlet which will be used in our speaking engagements and is more informative than the SOS's Blue Booklet that is mailed to all registered voters.

Gerry will be coming to Cortez to train our League and La Plata County members September 18. Plan to meet Gerry who is a wealth of information and to become more informed of the Ballot Issue whether you speak to local groups or not.

Our League has been invited to participate with a La Plata County's Fiscal Responsibility Information Committee, which is creating a presentation for the community on fiscal initiatives that will appear on the general election ballot. Hopefully, we can help organize such an initiative in Montezuma. Local governments and taxing districts can be negatively impacted by these initiatives. We can leverage the efforts of La Plata County.

Voter Service activities are a keystone for the League and give us great visibility of activities that we do better than nearly any other organization.
